



Q. TELL US A BIT ABOUT YOUR PROFESSIONAL CAREER?

My career started with the 20 years in the Air Force as a Telecommunications Specialist. I secured a degree in Telecommunications Engineering, and a Degree in Management from the University of Maryland. I retired from the AF and went to work for Contel as an analog/digital switch Engineer/Technician. Contel had a contract with the CIA where I worked from 1989 to 1992. In 1992 Contel merged with GTE. GTE lost the contract with the CIA that same year. I transferred over to an installation team to work on the AF contract, upgrading Tech Control Facilities. I went to Cheyenne Mt, Co. and Offutt, Ne. to do the upgrades. Two places I had already been stationed at before. Returned to the DC area in 1994 on a contract with the State Dept. Then, when GTE merged with Verizon that same year, I decided I had had enough traveling and went to work for ARINC as a Network Manager until 2001.

Q. WHAT AND WHO GOT YOU INTEREST-ED IN WOODWORK-ING?

Like I said earlier I grew up around woodworking. But I think I really got interested in Junior High School. My grandfather showed me a lot about fretwork and using a fretsaw. My shop teacher, Mr. Olson, was my real idol. I had him as an instructor all though Junior High and High school.

Q. WHAT ARE YOUR FAVOR-ITE SCROLLSAW PROJECTS?

I've done so many different things. I'd have to say my favorite is scroll sawn art and clocks. This year I'm working more on a military theme.

Q. HAVE YOU RECEIVED AWARDS OR RECOGNITIONS FOR ANY OF YOUR WOODWORKING PROJECTS, IF SO WHAT WERE THEY FOR AND BY WHOM?

I have received some first, second and third place ribbons from Catonsville Arts & Craft Fairs. I also received ribbons from Tri-County Scrollers picnic held several years ago in Pennsylvania.

Q. AS A PAST RECENT PRESIDENT WHERE DO YOU SEE THE GUILD IN THE FUTURE AND WHAT IS YOU FAVORITE THINGS ABOUT THE GUILD NOW?

The guild has really grown since I was President. There have been lots of new members who want to learn woodworking or get back into it. More training and classes are being developed and offered to members. I've learned a lot from the guild but my favorite thing is the toy workshop and the opportunity to work on special projects. Just spending time with fellow woodworkers is rewarding.

Q. YOU ARE INVOLVED IN A TOY WORKSHOP WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS YOU HAVE RECEIVED FROM SUCH AN EXPERIENCE?

I am with a toy workshop in Severna Park. There are 6 of us in the group. We meet every Monday starting the first week of February and end just prior to the Guild Christmas Dinner. We all have learned from each other and have a great time. We make hundreds of toys to be given to children through different organizations.

Q. WHAT WOODWORKING PUBLICATIONS DO YOU READ AND WHICH ONE DO YOU REFER TO MOST OFTEN?

This is a tough one. At one time I was receiving over 30 woodworking magazines. Since then, a lot have ceased publication or merged with others. Now I'm down to 11 subscriptions. My scroll saw magazines are my go to number one magazines.

Q. DESCRIBE YOUR WORKSHOP (LOCATION, SIZE, POWER TOOLS, IMPORTANT HAND TOOLS, JIGS COMMONLY USED AND IS THERE ANYTHING UNUSAL ABOUT YOUR SHOP.

My shop is housed in a finished basement of our home. I utilize 3 areas of the basement. The main shop area is 12-1/2 ft. $\times 24-1/2$ ft. The other area is 12-1/2 ft. $\times 13-1/2$ ft. used as a craft room and scroll saw room. The 3^{rd} room is 12-1/2 ft. $\times 9-1/2$ ft. and used as the shop office/library. It is a full shop and is setup as a scrollers workshop. I do teach scroll sawing in this shop.



Q. YOU GO TO CRAFT SHOWS TO SELL YOUR SCROLLSAW PROJECTS. HOW MANY WEEKENDS A YEAR AND WHAT TYPE OF ITEMS SELL BEST?

My wife and I do sell at crafts shows. We start in September and go until a week or two before Christmas. My biggest seller right now are the military plaques. Next I would say my scroll sawn crosses and kid's puzzles.

Q. WHAT ELSE WOULD YOU LIKE US TO KNOW ABOUT YOU? I love my weekends at home, watching NASCAR!

Q. ARE YOU DOING ANYTHING SPECIAL NOW THAT GIVES YOU GREAT JOY?

As most of you know, I suffered some nerve damage around the holiday season. I am grateful to all the members that helped me through that time. One of my fears during that time was the possibility to no longer work with tools. It gives me great pleasure to be able to get back into it and go to the workshop every week.




