

Q. TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF: HOMETOWN, BACKGROUND, EDUCATION, PROFESSION, AND OTHER INTEREST.

I was born in Baltimore, Maryland. I graduated from Lansdowne Senior High School, and took up mechanical engineering at Anne Arundel Community College. I married Arleen and we have one son and two grandsons. I was Assistant Scout Master with Troop 918 for several years, and just this past Sunday helped one grandson making his Pinewood Derby car. In 1968, I took an apprenticeship as a Tool & Die Maker at A.F.& G. Tool & Die in Baltimore. In 1971 I started an apprenticeship as a Model Maker at David Taylor Naval Research Center Annapolis, Maryland. In 1995 the Brack Commission closed the Annapolis site, and I was transferred to Carderock to what is now the Naval Surface Warfare Center. I then retired with 35 years of federal service. During that time I held several positions: Model Maker Machinist Supervisor, Computer Numerical Controlled Programmer, Apprentice Instructor, Planner & Estimator, and Model Maker Supervisor.

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

I took woodworking in High School. I had a lot of hand and power tools for projects around the house but did not start buying woodworking equipment in earnest, until 1990, after building a garage that has never seen a car.

Q. YOU AND YOUR WIFE ARE BOTH INTERESTED IN WOODWORK-ING. HOW DOES THAT WORK OUT AT HOME?

We go to the woodworking shows at the state fair grounds every year, sit in on several demonstrations, and started buying equipment. I joined the Annapolis Woodworkers Guild in 2010 after seeing them at the show. My wife comes to the meetings after work because she enjoys the talks. I have made several projects and she finds sanding them very relaxing. If anything needs painting, she does the painting. She helps me with handling some of the larger pieces of wood, but she does not want to join until she retires. I have tried teaching her, but she wants to take some of the classes the Guild offers.



Q. WHAT GOT YOU INTERESTED IN WOODWORKING?

My first exposure was high school wood shop. After being a machinist for 40 years cutting metal, composites, and plastics, woodworking became very appealing.

Q. WHAT ARE YOUR FAVORITE WOODWORKING PROJECTS?

I have made a microwave table with a drop leaf, a table top for a drill press with built in vacuum port with fence and tee slots, a drill press tool cabinet with two sliding shelves, and a table saw outfeed support roller. Toys I have made include: a steam shovel that grandson sits on, a rocking dinosaur, helicopters with turning rotors top and back, a T-rex with moving legs and jaw, alligator pull toys, and whirly-gigs.

Q. HAVE YOU RECEIVED AWARDS OR RECOGNITIONS FOR ANY OF YOUR WOODWORKING PROJECTS? IF SO, WHAT WERE THEY FOR AND BY WHOM?

In February 2012, the Guild President (Jim Francis) presented to me an award certificate for new member involvement in guild activities, contributing to the Christmas toy programs, and serving on various committees.



Q. WHAT WOODWORKING PUBLICA-TIONS DO YOU READ, AND WHICH ONE DO YOU REFER TO MOST OFTEN?

I subscribe to Shop Notes. It has merged and is now Woodsmith. I have made 3 projects from it.



Q. WHAT OR WHO HAS INFLUNCED YOUR WOODWORKING INTERESTS?

After being a machinist for 38 years cutting metal, doing woodworking seems to be a natural progression and more enjoyable cutting wood. I enjoy seeing other member's shop setups and their specialties. I have had Paul Dodson come to my shop and give me advice on scroll sawing and I have taken his scroll sawing class. I have taken the box making class with Don Ames and Andy Borland. Most of all I have enjoyed the camaraderie and each member's willingness to share their talents and knowledge.

Q. DESCRIBE YOUR WORKSHOP (LOCATION, SIZE, POWER TOOLS, IMPORTANT HAND TOOLS, JIGS COMMONLY USED, AND IS THERE ANYTHING UNUSUAL ABOUT YOUR SHOP?


My Shop is in the 24'X 30 garage and is stocked with several machines and tools: a 1955 Shopsmith, drill press, band saw, table saw, jointer planner, ¼" router, sanders, and scroll saw. The most unusual thing about my shop is it is full of other tools, not only woodworking. I collect minerals and fossils and cut stones for lapidary. I look forward to trying to inlay rock slices into wood projects.

Q. I KNOW YOU HAVE TAKEN OVER AS OUR LIBRARIAN/ MEDIA SPECIALIST. TELL US ABOUT THAT AND HOW WE CAN USE YOUR SERVICES.

There is a listing of 64 DVDs and 93 VHS tapes available on the Guild's web site. The DVDs are brought to every meeting, but the tapes must be requested ahead of the meeting and will be brought in. They can be lent out to any current member and should be returned at the next meeting. DVDs should work fine on nearly all players, but some need to be played on a desktop or laptop personal computer. Please report any problems you experience. If there is a specific interest in a DVD/tape we do not currently have, let me know and I will try to acquire it. I am located in the back of the meeting room with the DVDs in an aluminum case. Your name and date are recorded and deleted upon return.

Q. ARE YOU DOING ANYTHING SPECIAL NOW THAT GIVES YOU GREAT JOY?

Learning new techniques and developing woodworking skills. Making and giving home-made gifts for family and friends out of wood.

AWG Training Award Program

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION: Periodically thought out the calendar Year (approximately 2/year) a ticket will be issued to those AWG members wishing to participate in a special drawing. Drawings occur in the months of May and December. The winner will receive \$500 dollars to be used solely for training purposes in a woodworking area of their choice.

Entry into the drawing is free. One ticket per active member will be issued. The AWG Treasurer will verify his/her membership. Entries will be collected during the General Membership meetings in April and November. AWG members can also e-mail an entry to the President during the collection period. At the AGW General Membership meetings in May and December a winner will be randomly selected.

Winners do not have to be present to win.

Winners cannot sell or transfer the award.

The money can only be used for woodworking training purposes to provide the Guild member the opportunity to enhance his or her present woodworking skills. It cannot be used for tool purchases, airfare, food or lodging. The award dollars will not be issued to the winner but instead sent directly to the school or training facility where the course is conducted. Winner has one year to spend the money. AWG Membership Chairman must keep records.

In the event a winner cancels the course, for whatever reason, or does not complete the training course, the member is responsible for returning to the Guild the \$500.00 within thirty days.

The winner, after completion, is required to brief Guild members at a General Membership meeting on the course taken, item produced, and lessons/benefits received from the course.
















Wisdom, Wit & Whatnot
