# EXPERIENCED SAWDUST with BRUCE SAYLOR By Andy Borland

Q. TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF: HOMETOWN, BACK-GROUND, EDUCATION, PROFESSION, AND OTHER INTERESTS.



After high school I worked installing and finishing drywall. I worked in the field for 8 years, and then started my own commercial drywall company. It grew to a small/mid-size company employing 25 people on average. I retired from my drywall and general contracting business of 20 years in 2002. I am semi retired now, an owner and manager of rental property. Also, in 2003 I obtained my Real Estate License.

Being semi retired has many benefits, one of the biggest being "time". I knew my woodworking hobby could be expanded to fill some of that void. I have always enjoyed woodworking, and now I can focus my time on my woodworking passion.

I started Pop Pop's Workshop (my garage). I enjoy making toys, outdoor chairs, and other projects that looked like fun to build. I started making pieces for my children, my granddaughters, and myself, then friends and now some for the public.

## Classes at The School of Annapolis Woodworks

#### **Hand Plane**



Course Description: Students will learn how to make a wooden plane. A handmade wooden plane is light, responsive and capable of the finest smoothing and shaping. In this two-day class, students will employ basic woodworking skills to transform a block of hardwood into a sensitive and lasting tool. As the planes are completed, students will learn or refine sharpening and planing techniques. They

will also become more knowledgeable about a plane's mechanics in general, enabling them to troubleshoot and tune up any plane. Each woodworker is issued his/her own tools used during the class. Wood, glue, sandpaper and finishes are all included in the materials fee.

Tuition: \$250.00 + Materials fee \$60.00 Held August 24 and 25.


#### **Scroll and Ribbon Tray**

Course Description: This two-day introductory class focuses on basic carving skill as students make a carved scroll and ribbon tray to take home. These delightful trays trace back to the 1800's, and were used to carry tea and other refreshments into the parlor. Wood, glue, and sandpaper are included in the materials fee.

**Tuition:** \$250.00 + \$20.00 materials fee.





I always travel straight and true— Turn neither left nor right, And never once I've lost my head Or fail to stick real tight.


I always stay right in my place, Through bright or cloudy weather— Just sticking tight with all my might, A-holding things together.
