Experienced SawdustBy Andy Borland

Don Ames, one of the founders of AWG, turns 90 this month. We are rerunning his Sawdust article from October, 2013 to commemorate his birthday.

AWG: Don, tell us about yourself, your hometown, background, profession, and other interests.

DON: My hometown is currently and has been for many years, Annapolis. I also have a strong at-



I grew to my late teen years and from where I enlisted in the Navy in 1945. I have a high school education and two and a half years of technical training in Court reporting which I did for a living until 1993, when I retired. My other interests are primarily woodworking and family.

AWG: How long have you been interested in woodworking?

DON: Since about the 5th grade. We worked using coping saws and wooden boxes to make small objects(hot pad holders and the like), as well as small shelves and do-dads. That interest continued for many years except for while I was in military service.

AWG: What got you interested in woodworking?

DON: I watched two different elderly "German-trained" cabinet makers in a small town in Minnesota.

AWG: Tell us a little bit about the formation of our Guild.

DON: The formation of the Annapolis Woodworking Guild started in 1989 with Charlie Weant and me. He and I were traveling to Towson to attend the Baltimore Woodworking Guild at Towson State University. We decided to form our own Guild so we could stop traveling so far. We started advertising in the Evening Capital newspaper and called a meeting at the Annapolis Library. It has grown from that. With the help and expertise of quite a few others it has become the Guild we have today.

AWG: What are your favorite woodworking projects?

DON: That's pretty hard to say. I've made Colonial spice cabinets, which really held my interest. I've made five Windsor style chairs for my daughter and family which really tested and interested me. I've made a number of bed frames for grandchildren. All of these things I enjoyed and were thoroughly interested in making. I have also made many large cabinets.

AWG: Have you received any awards or recognition for any of your woodworking projects?

DON: I have won numerous awards from the Guild.

AWG: What or who has influenced your woodworking interest?

DON: James Krenov, Christian Becksvoort and Phil Lowe. These gentlemen are some of the really great craftsmen whom I admire greatly. I was also influenced, as stated earlier, by the two elderly "Germantrained" cabinet makers.

AWG: What woodworking publications do you read and which ones do you refer to most often?

DON: Fine Woodworking, Popular Woodworking, Hand Plane Essentials, and The Hand Plane Book are what I refer to most often. There are others that are too numerous to mention. I sometimes refer to Joseph Moxon's book <u>Mechanick Exercises</u>, 1703 edition. (This book is available online thru Google.)

AWG: Describe your workshop: location, size, power tools, important hand tools, jigs commonly used, and anything unusual about your shop.

DON: My shop is a 20 foot by 16 foot free-standing building in my backyard. It contains a Delta contractor's table saw, an 8- inch jointer, a 16- inch band saw, a 13- inch planer, drill press, small lathe and a router table with a Triton router. I have a number of hand planes, both manufactured and handmade, which I enjoy using. Tools in my shop include accurate squares, back saws and decent chisels. These are all important to me, and I consider my shop just a usual standard shop.

AWG: Are you doing anything special now that gives you great joy?

DON: I am not doing anything special at this moment. I've been rather lax over the summer.

FINAL THOUGHT: I have very fond memories of starting woodworking in a one-room school house with just a coping saw and the side of an apple box on Friday afternoons.


Guild Interests

Peter Gedrys, brought back by popular demand, spent the weekend explaining the why and whereof of finishing.




The Gedrys classes were held at Troy Beall's Scholl at Annapolis Woodworks.






