

## AWG President's Message by Rick Hodgdon



Fellow Woodworkers,

At the February 28 board meeting we discussed the Guild's current financial standing. At this time the Guild has approximately \$8,000 in the general fund and \$32,300 in the Endowment Fund. The Endowment Fund originated with a donation from William Schram. With these initial funds came a benefactor's request that the money was to be used only for educational purposes: "It is Billy's wish for this money to be used for educational purposes, to pay for speakers at meetings, purchase whatever is needed for the library, pay for educational trips, scholarships, and for any other educational use the club feels is appropriate."

The AWG Endowment Fund Committee (AEFC) was created to administer this fund and the Guild's bylaws were amended to include: "The Executive Board will submit a written request to the AEFC for determination if a proposed expenditure meets the intent of the wishes of the benefactor. The AEFC will provide a written response as to whether the request does or does not meet the intent of the wishes of the benefactor and is within bounds of applicable state and federal laws"

Recently, the AWG board has agreed that the following clarification statement needs to be added to the bylaws to more explicitly state our benefactor's wishes and to make best use of the endowment in future expenditures:

- 1. The first priority of the endowment shall be to fund AWG general meeting speakers.
- 2. The second priority of the endowment shall be to fund Training/ Workshops where the cost is minimal.

Subsidies from the Endowment Fund greatly enhance the quality of Guild programs. For example, currently the average cost expended for our monthly speakers is \$150.00 and the current cost associated with a workshop like a box-making class is about \$20.00 per student.

Major events like Garrett Hack presentations in April cost the Guild significantly more (Garrett's event will total almost \$4,000). His program will benefit 40 to 50 woodworkers, or about half of our current membership, for a cost of about \$100.00 per individual.

Some major fiscal goals of the AWG Board are to make best use of our finite Endowment Fund and to hold the yearly dues to a modest amount. In the future, when the Schram Endowment Fund is exhausted, our membership fee would be the only source available to cover all our annual expenses. We simply could not continue to provide all our current activities with a \$36 annual dues fee. With this in mind, the board has elected to discontinue our biannual \$500.00 single member educational award so the benefits of our endowment may be shared over more of our membership and over a longer period of time.

Work on a project such as this requires careful planning. Getting to the location requires a boat trip on the order of half an hour, so running to a store for a part or fetching a forgotten tool is simply out of the question. Howard and Cathy Lewis, members of the restoration and preservation team provide this trip to our Guild members and others. Howard and Cathy presented each member with a shirt symbolizing their contributions to the lighthouse restoration.



Each month we all benefit from the experiences of our members as they display and explain their latest woodworking creations. Here are February's show and tell participants:





## **Vendor Review**

#### **Wurth Wood Group**

Recently some hinges on our 20+ year old kitchen cabinets began acting up. The existing hinges are of the "Euro" type, with dimensions in millimeters and not easy to find. In fact, the ones I wanted to replace were no longer manufactured, but I had a replacement part number, so I begin looking.

After a lot of less than satisfying searching around the internet I did what I should have done at the start



I took a look at the list of vendors that sponsor AWG—the list is at the end of this newsletter. There I found The Wurth Wood Group. At their web site they had exactly the hinges and hinge parts I was looking for!

Their web site indicated I had to set up an online account to see item prices, which I did. Later, I found out that AWG already has an "account" established with them and I just needed to refer to that one. Wurth is a big organization and it appears its normal clients are largely commercial. In my initial contacts I was a bit intimidated by this, but I quickly found Wurth employees to be very easy to work with and they made me feel my small-potatoes purchase was equally important.

To save you some steps in your dealings with Wurth I offer what I learned from my adventure:

First look online for the things that you may want to purchase, then either email or call their sales department with your list. In your emails or phone calls let them know that you are with AWG. They will put your order under the AWG account for pricing and send you a quote. All small sales, like mine, are "COD", meaning that you will need to pay up front (credit card over the phone) and you will need to go to the Wurth location to pick up your stuff.

The nearest Wurth is located in Elkridge, Maryland. Their site is very easy to get to—it's only about a mile or so from the junction of Rt 100 and Rt 1, which is not far from the Arundel Mills Mall. At the Wurth site you will find a rather large warehouse with a small office section off to one end (see picture above). In the office section there are two side-by-side doors. Will-call is located to the right and is clearly labeled.

The personnel inside were very helpful and efficient in getting all the bits picked for my order (it took maybe 10 minutes). Soon I was on my way home with a box of hard to get parts found the easy way and for what I believe was a very good price. A bonus (I did not use) is that you pass near a casino on the way home. An opportunity to double your savings? Instead I used mine to buy a new tool.... C.W.

## **Woodworking Classes**

Troy Beall's **Annapolis Woodworks** school in Davidsonville will offer the following classes to AWG members this spring/summer. The Guild will provide a subsidy of \$25.00 to each attendee. Sign-up lists and registration directions will be made available at future AWG meetings. Each class will need a minimum of 5 students to be held and can accommodate a maximum of 10 students.

#### Routers 101 class: weekday June 7, weekend May 25

Course Description: Students will learn how to choose the right router and proper bit for the job. Some of the projects to be covered in class will be Dado cuts, mortise and tenons, profiling an edge, pattern cutting, jointing and flattening boards, basic inlays, and much more. All day classes start at 8:30 and run until 5:00pm with a half hour lunch break around noon.

Tuition: \$ 125.00 + \$25.00 materials fee

#### Sharpening: weekday July 19, weekend June 29

Course Description: This class is designed to help woodworkers understand the principles of sharpening. With newfound skills, students will be able to sharpen anything. This class requires tools...dull ones that are ready to be sharpened. Sharpening may include turning chisels, bench, mortise, paring chisels, any shape or size carving chisels, plane irons, chain saw blades and hand saws (cross cut or rip). Classes run from 8:30am to 5:00 pm with a half hour lunch break.
